Overcoming School Obstacles Through Movement

Physical Education provides structured movement experiences that support sensory regulation, social skills, motor development, and emotional well-being—addressing core challenges autistic children face in school.

Motor Skills

- Develops coordination & balance
- Improves body awareness
- Builds muscle tone
- Enhances physical confidence

Sensory Regulation

- Provides sensory input
- Regulates processing
- Improves focus after activity
- Reduces meltdowns

Social Skills

- Practices turn-taking
- Learns rules & routines
- Develops peer relationships
- Improves communication

Emotional Support

- Reduces anxiety & stress
- Provides energy outlet
- Builds self-esteem
- Improves classroom behavior

PE Solutions for Autism-Related Obstacles

Sensory Overload

Overwhelmed by stimuli

Controlled movement provides organizing input

Social Isolation

Difficulty with peers

Structured activities teach social rules

Motor Delays

Poor coordination

Practice builds skills progressively

Anxiety

Meltdowns, rigidity

Predictable routines reduce uncertainty

Attention Issues

Can't focus in class

Movement improves concentration

Low Self-Esteem

Feeling different

Success builds confidence



Research Evidence

Motor Skills

Structured PE significantly improves gross motor skills, balance, and coordination (Srinivasan et al., 2014)

Social Communication

PE activities enhance interaction and peer relationships (Zhao & Chen, 2018)

Behavior

Physical activity reduces stereotypic behaviors and anxiety (Lang et al., 2010)

Regulation

Movement activities improve sensory processing and reduce problems (Pan, 2010)
